Pre conference workshop on Dermoscopy is the need of the hour.


Shillong, the Scotland of east, will provide a scenic background and plenty of site seeing places will attract large number of participants.

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PAKISTANI BOMB

This story dates back to the year 1965. Month September, India and Pakistan were engaged in fierce war and the affect of the war had reached to the North Eastern region. I was in the final year of my MBBS in Guwahati Medical College Hospital. After our summer recess, we were asked to shift to the newly constructed hostel at the foothills of Narakasur Hills, Dispur. During that time, the GMCH was situated in Mahendra Mohan Choudhury Hospital (MMCH) at Panbazar, a distance of about 7 kms from our hostel. The hospital authority had provided buses to commute to and fro from the hostel to hospital. Our hostel was situated in a very secluded place as there was not a single business establishment in and around our hostel. We had to walk about a kilometre to G.S. Road even to buy small essential items like soaps and eggs. The only restaurant, Mistimukh, was about 3 kilometres away from our hostel.

As war loom large, all boarders, except the final year students were asked to vacate the hostel. Here in our hostel, we were trained by military personnel as how to protect ourselves in case of an emergency. We were taught to build our own trench for our safety. The trench should be either V or Z shape and each limb should be around two to three feet in length and at least one foot in depth. While some of us took the task very seriously and build an entire trench in a day, others did not bother. The army personnel further instructed that in the event of an air strike, the civil defence cell will blow sirens to intimidate of the impending danger. We also had mock drills for a few times to prepare us for the danger, if any. At that time, Bangladesh was a part of Pakistan and they had several air bases at Dhaka. People of the northeast were scared because of a possible air strike by Pakistan due of its proximity to Assam.

One night, rumours were strong that two Pakistani fighter planes reconnaissance around Guwahati to drop bombs at the newly constructed Saraighat Bridge. However, the Pakistanis dropped the plan for that day as they were not sure of the target. There were also murmurs around that our newly constructed hostel could also be a possible target. One day in the middle of a night, we got



up suddenly with someone shouting "Siren, Siren" "Come down" "Run to trench immediately" etc. I was a boarder in the second floor and with sleepy eyes ran out of my room. There was chaos inside the building and everybody ran in the hope to reach to their individual trench soon and bumped into each other.

When I reached my trench, I found someone had already occupied my trench. When I asked him to vacate my trench, he calm said "this is not the time to argue about whose trench it is or not. It's a matter of life and death, no time to discuss what's mine and what's yours. If the enemy drops a bomb neither you nor I will survive. Go and lie down to the next safest possible place". Unable to find a trench for myself to hide, I lied down on the ground with my eyes closed and covering my ears with my hands.

As we lie down on the ground, and waiting for the fighter plan to come and drop bombs and getting us killed any minute, there was no sounds of any planes hovering around in the sky. Half an hour passed by, and neither there were any sounds of enemy planes nor any clearance signal. Everyone got anxious and tired of waiting inside the trench. While no one had the courage to do so, finally one of our batch mates gathered some courage and came out of the trench. He gathered the courage and asked "Who heard the siren first?" But no one came with a reply. After few minutes, when everyone was out of trench and look at each other, we realised that a particular classmate was absent in this entire chaos. Not too sure, if he had played the mischief or not, we ran towards his room to see if he is okay. When we reached his room, we found him sleeping peacefully in his bed.

Yet it is vaingloriously said that majority brings with it, men's maturity in judgement and wisdom.

Dispassionately viewed in addition to orthodoxy and ignorance man's playing politics wherever and whenever it might be with religion as tool is a factor creating cleavages and chasms among men bringing suffering ruin-age in its trail.

Politics concerns slab fit for raising pre-fabricated structure but unfit for raising garden of love, amity and fellow-feeling. To the politicians to whom amassment of earthly resources become the only one goal of life, an issue be it religion having the prospect of leading to self and power becomes far more important than even the very continuance of life on our planet.

It is indeed politics – the game of convenience and lurge of the educated elite of our society as politicians that divided, on religion basis India where people of all faiths lived together for ages as a garland of flowers of variegated colours intertwined by an unseen thread of love, empathy and brotherliness.

Present day political pyrexia under a thin veneer of religious fervour wherever be it betray a refusal to accept the truth that civilization is leading man only where he sprang from.

Cunning cunning is man



August 25, 2014:

That day I was talking to one of my patients. He was a young guy of 25 years. After his examination was over, I casually asked him what his father does for a living. He answered,

"He has done a lot for us Sir. Now we have asked him to take rest. My mother expired long back when we were still too young. I don't even remember her face! You know, his reply was totally unexpected, but it created such a heart warming feeling that I feel short of words to express it properly.

Same day I had my clinic at my hometown Morigaon. After finishing my duty at my workplace at Guwahati, I reached there at around 4 pm. As I was likely to become late after finishing my patients at my chamber, my parents left early for the marriage. At around 7.30pm, I started my journey with some of my relatives. As I reached the marriage hall, I noticed Maa and Papa with the bridegroom. Papa was telling something and both the bridegroom and my mother were happily responding with smiles. 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

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
